Historical Note of Interest

The Provincial Freeman is of historical importance as an anti-slavery newspaper published first in Windsor, moving to Toronto, and finally located in Chatham. The Provincial Freeman had an international readership, published by Mary Ann Shadd, who has been designated as a Person of National Historical Significance in both Canada and the United States. Mary Ann Shadd was the daughter of Abraham Shadd who lived just outside the Buxton Settlement and was instrumental in the establishment of Buxton School - S.S. #13. The main road of Buxton is named to honour his many contributions to the community.
